

A total of **62** participants have now been randomised.






Thanks to all sites who have recruited so far – keep up the fantastic work.

Meet the Team

The NIHR Clinical Research Network North East and North Cumbria's Direct Delivery Team (DDT) has been supporting the REDUCe2 study since September 2023. The DDT is an agile research team who work across primary care, secondary care and community settings. They have a particular focus on increasing opportunities for under-served communities to be involved in research.

The DDT has been working closely with the hepatology research team at Newcastle Hospitals Trust to deliver REDUCe2. Following screening, consent and randomisation, if a participant has been randomised to the Long Term Abdominal Drain (LTAD) arm of the study, the DDT will arrange follow-up visits in the participant's own home.

DDT staff have enjoyed being part of this important study and have felt privileged to be able to visit the participants at home. Likewise, participants in the study have commented on how much they value home visits. One participant's caregiver said: "Mum [...] really appreciates the additional company the research team and the district nurses provide [...]. You always put a smile on her face the day you visit."

HOUSEKEEPING

Questionnaire completion

Please remember that the SFLDQoL questionnaire is a primary endpoint so it's important that this is completed at each visit.

If a participant is tired it is reasonable for research staff to read out the questions for the participant to answer.

TOP TIP - Start with the SFLDQoL questionnaire and move on to the others afterwards.

Proxy Scores

Proxy scores are used for patients who cannot provide their own verbal responses. Another person who is (*most*) familiar with the patient (*family member, caregiver, HCP*) provides the answers on their behalf.

This is different from a patient who can give verbal responses but cannot write them down.

A header has been added to the SFLDQoL questionnaire to confirm who completed it: Participant (Yourself) or by Proxy score (Someone on Your Behalf). This will be shared with sites.

Documents to be sent after randomisation

Please send the following documents to reduce2@bsms.ac.uk via Secure email:

- Patient consent form
- Eligibility Checklist signed by PI / Co-PI to confirm eligibility
- Caregiver consent form (if applicable)
- Expression of Interest forms for the Qualitative Interview for the patient and / or caregiver, if applicable. These will then be forwarded to SHORE-C.

These should be sent within 2 weeks of randomisation.
